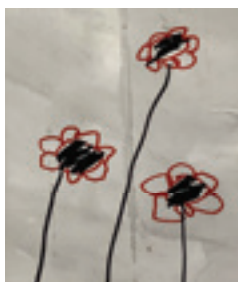

Taking flight through history

“Jambo” means “hello” in Swahili, just one of the many fascinating facts that the Year 2 children enjoyed learning during our Geography lessons in the first half of term. We began by looking at the continent of Africa and then zoomed in to focus on the country of Kenya. Our studies culminated in a day where we celebrated Africa. The children learnt fun African games, African dances and songs, completed an animal pattern art challenge and produced an animal picture in the style of the Tanzanian painter, Edward Tingatinga.

In the second half of term, we switched our focus to History. The children worked their way along a timeline, tracking the history of flight. They asked and responded to some big questions during our studies and learnt about truly inspirational people including the Montgolfier brothers, the Wright brothers, Amelia Earhart, Bessie Coleman and Neil Armstrong.

In Science, we have explored all the different ways we can keep our bodies healthy. The children have been able to explain and justify their thinking very well during discussions. As our area of study shifted to ‘Forces’, we conducted experiments, made connections to our History lessons about the Moon Landing, and delved into the concept of gravity.

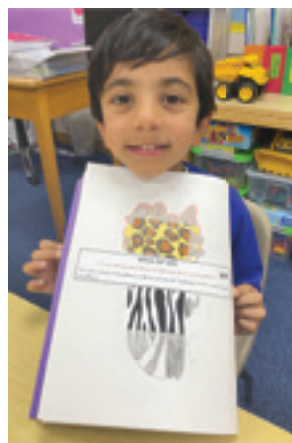
Throughout the term, we have encouraged and promoted ‘Critical Thinking’, incorporating it into as many lessons as possible. Weekly activities in the Imagination Station have supported this goal, with children showing great progress in using ‘Thinking Moves’ and starting to take more initiative. They have enjoyed using AI (ChatGPT) to help find out about our fortnightly ‘Inspirational Person’ and to respond to the ‘Thunk’ that we have up in the classroom.

This term, all four Year 2 classes had the opportunity to lead an assembly. The children spoke confidently in front of the audiences and worked well together on their chosen themes.

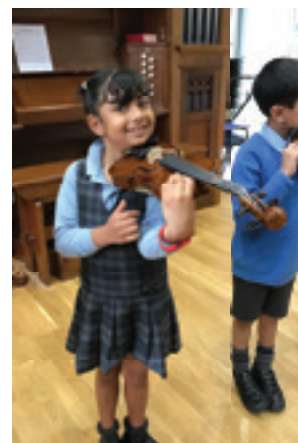

The highlight of the museum visit was the 'Enchanted Library' where children entered famous stories. They stood inside Alice's Wonderland, played Poohsticks on Winnie the Pooh's bridge and were brave enough to step through the wardrobe and enter Narnia! What an experience! Finally, in the historic 'Backstage' classroom, the children channelled their own author skills to design and describe the perfect room for a fawn.

Echoes of the Great War

The Year 5 pupils have certainly impressed this term, having made an amazing transition from Middle School into Upper School. They have eagerly embraced opportunities for further responsibility around school, taking on roles such as Play Leaders, Digital Leaders, Librarians and Wellbeing Ambassadors.

Our learning so far has been extraordinarily thought-provoking, with The Windrush Generation being a key focus in History. A very special visit from Mr Johnson, a Warwick Prep grandfather, helped deepen our understanding through his first-hand account of travelling from Jamaica to Britain aboard the SS Ascania in 1960. Leaving behind the warmth of the Caribbean as a young boy, Mr Johnson shared his journey, reflecting on the new friendships he forged and the racism and hostility he overcame, through his courage and compassion.

In English, we have been reading Michael Morpurgo's novel 'War Horse' which has inspired us to write from the perspectives of Joey, the brave World War I horse, as well as a soldier and a civilian affected by the war's tragedies. This powerful story complemented the knowledge we gained while preparing for our Remembrance Service held in the Warwick School Chapel. Each Year 5 pupil made a poignant contribution to the service, expressing respect and gratitude to those who fought for our freedom.



We had an exciting Link Day with the boys from Warwick Junior School, centred around Maths and STEAM activities. Working in mixed groups, pupils tackled two fun and engaging challenges: designing an experiment to measure and test reaction times and constructing a wind-powered car using just three straws, a piece of paper, two paper clips and four Polos. The day showcased our Skills for Life in action, with pupils demonstrating creativity, collaboration, communication, critical thinking and problem-solving throughout the challenges.

The final highlights of our term included the fabulous Winter Concert, our Prep Carol Service at St Mary's Church, and, of course, Christmas lunch and the Upper School party. A fantastic term indeed!

Unearthing the Shang Dynasty

The Year 6 girls settled in quickly this September, ready to embrace everything the final year at Warwick Prep has to offer. Those in positions of responsibility swiftly grasped their roles and all Year 5 and Year 6 pupils were delighted to welcome back the Tuck Shop at break times after half term!

The primary focus for the first half of term was preparation for the entrance exams. It was evident that the girls who had worked hard over the summer holidays hit the ground running and were eager to build on their efforts in English and Maths lessons. Their dedication was rewarded with an impressive range of academic and subject scholarships and we are incredibly proud of all their achievements.

As part of our History topic on the 'Shang Dynasty', we visited Compton Verney to learn more about Ancient Chinese artefacts dating back over 3000 years! The girls examined a variety of ritual vessels which deepened their understanding of life during this fascinating period. Wearing protective gloves, the girls were allowed to handle authentic artefacts dating back to 1600 BCE, working out what they were made from and what they would have been used for. The afternoon was spent creatively, as the girls modelled their own ritual vessels out of clay.

Year 5 and Year 6 girls were introduced to Café Scientifique by the Year 12 editors from King's High School who explained the science behind their e-magazine and encouraged our pupils to write an article.

In November, we enjoyed a Maths Link Day with the Year 6 boys from Warwick Junior School. Working in mixed groups, the children designed and built wind-powered vehicles and tested their reaction times against one another. This activity sparked lively competition between the girls and boys, though we couldn't possibly disclose which group came out on top!

At the end of November, the girls took part in our annual visit to the Space Centre where they explored our place in the solar system and beyond. Throughout the day, the girls learnt about the skills needed to become an astronaut and the history of the Space Race.

The term finished with the Upper School Christmas party where the girls enjoyed traditional party games and showcased their dance moves – a warm-up for the school disco next term!

Later in the term, our Year 3 girls had their first experience in a school gala, taking on friendly competition against Warwick Junior School and working hard on their techniques. The Warwick 25s gala brought further excitement, with Year 5 and Year 6 girls competing against schools like Edgbaston High School and Blue Coat School. Our girls performed brilliantly, taking home the Year 6 trophy and the overall girls' team trophy. Special congratulations to Chloe and Nehna for securing 1st place in their individual events.

The U11 football team faced strong opposition in their season opener at the ESFA U12 Cup. Despite the challenging match, the girls displayed persistence and resilience and are motivated for the season ahead.

Their next test came in the IAPS Regional Finals where the team experienced a day of mixed emotions in Loughborough. After a strong start in the group stages, including a standout 2-0 win against Tranby, the girls advanced to the quarter finals. Despite dominating play and creating several chances, they were narrowly defeated 2-1 in a tense penalty shootout against Berkhamsted Prep. Though disappointed, the girls gained valuable experience and kept smiling throughout – a testament to their resilience and team spirit.

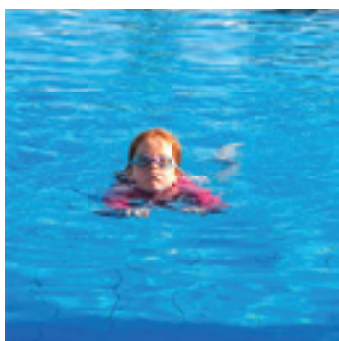

Empowering the next generation

On the afternoon of Tuesday 12 November, we and other pupils from local primary schools had the opportunity to attend a Q&A session with Malala Yousafzai's parents, Mr Ziauddin Yousafzai and his wife, Toor Pekai. They were visiting King's High School to open their new 'Peace Pod' and 'Prayer Room' which were devised by the school's Interfaith Group.

What an exciting afternoon this was for us as Warwick Prep Life Editors! In preparation for the event, we each thought of a question we hoped to ask during the session. We were not disappointed. Mr and Mrs Yousafzai were both calm, engaging and eager to answer as many questions as they could.

Elicia was one of the first Editors to pose her question, "How and where did Malala find the courage to speak out about education for girls?" Mr Yousafzai shared that their family deeply values democracy and freedom of expression. Smiling, he revealed he felt that he himself was her inspiration.

Sophie asked Mrs Yousafzai, "How has your life changed since moving to the UK in 2012?" Mrs Yousafzai candidly shared that the move was very challenging. "I was unable to speak English when we arrived. The culture was so different. I cried every day for three years and I only talked to the moon and the trees as they were familiar to me. In 2016, I began taking English classes and by the end of the year, I gained much independence. I could even go to the doctors for an appointment on my own."

Mr Yousafzai asked Mrs Yousafzai to share a funny story. "I found the confidence to go to the shops by myself to purchase a pair of weighing scales. I asked the shop keeper and mimed the action of jumping on a pair of scales but he couldn't help me because he was a greengrocer." She laughed at the memory, though admitted to feeling embarrassed at the time!

Phoebe was very keen to find out what Mr Yousafzai's thoughts were as Malala's father when his daughter wanted to oppose the Taliban restrictions on female education. He replied, "My thoughts were very mixed, but at the time, we didn't really reflect on it. You don't think about putting out a fire, you just get a bucket of water and put it out. No one had the right to take away Malala's education. She was unstoppable."

Sienna was deeply moved when Mr Yousafzai talked about what schools and children can do to help. He passionately urged, "Use your voice. We all have one. We should raise it for all those under oppression. Think of girls being denied an education and speak out."

For Elsie, the most inspiring moment came when Mr Yousafzai talked about how girls should not be kept from being part of the outside world and have a right to an education. He said, "Education is the front door to the house of life."

As the event came to an end, Mr Yousafzai graciously signed books we had purchased for our library to commemorate the occasion. Prabhjot was able to ask one last question composed by a fellow Editor, "If you had the ability to time travel, what would you change from the past and what would you change in the future?" Mr Yousafzai replied, "If I could go back, I would speak to my parents and ask them to give my five sisters the chance to be educated. I believe they had so much to offer. For the future, I dream of a world where everyone can access and complete their education."

What an unforgettable afternoon we all shared.

'The House with Chicken Legs' and 'The Girl Who Speaks Bear' by Sophie Anderson are among my favourites. I'm currently reading an advance copy of 'My Dog' by Olivia Wakeford which is set to be published in 2025 – I had to stop reading twice because it made me sob!

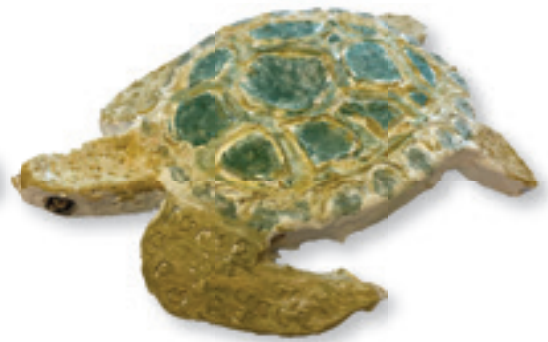
