



Anglo Saxons and Vikings

Year 5 have been extremely busy this term. The trip to St John's Museum was a fascinating start to their History topic, Anglo Saxons and Vikings. The girls explored the planning issues concerning the development of a new supermarket on an historic site. They enjoyed the immersive experience, taking part in role play including becoming archaeologists and discovering Anglo Saxon artefacts. At the end of the day, there was a concluding vote on whether the development should go ahead which stimulated much debate.

Another highlight was 'Viking Day'; the girls arrived at school in an amazing array of Viking costumes and thoroughly enjoyed a range of practical activities. They designed and created beautiful brooches inspired by Viking design. They made authentic shields complete with a boss and studs. The most memorable experience for many was dissecting a Viking coprolite (pool) to discover the dietary intake of a typical Viking. The day ended with a live link to the Jorvik Viking Centre in York which gave the girls another insight into the Viking raids and invasion of Britain.

We were so proud of the girls' moving and poignant Remembrance Service. Each one spoke eloquently; the message of their words and singing was both powerful and emotional. Being in Warwick School Chapel, surrounded by the memorials of those Warwickians who had lost their lives serving their country, was evocative and thought provoking for all who attended.

We were wowed by the variety, creativity and individuality of the Project Fortnight models inspired by American National Parks as part of our Geography topic. The girls demonstrated a range of skills including researching, writing-up and sharing facts about their Park. There was an outstanding range of geographical features represented, demonstrating the diverse landscape of the United States.



- **Q** Who inspires you and why?
- A Someone who stands out for me is Andy Goldsworth. He's a British artist who uses natural materials to create his artwork. His artwork changes throughout the seasons, or he moves the artwork himself so it is always different.
- **Q** Why did you start Forest School?
- A My grandad was a farmer so I always enjoyed being outside with nature. I used to volunteer at a Forest School and I loved seeing the smiles on the children's faces. I decided a year ago that it would be superb for the children at Warwick Prep to have a Forest School too. The joy which children experience when being outdoors with nature is marvellous.
- **Q** What are your visions or ideas for Forest School?
- A I would like to add a willow shelter for when it is very hot or very cold. We have a blue rope around Forest School but I would like this to be replaced with a hedge to create a stronger, more nature friendly barrier.



- **Q** What life skills do the children who attend Forest School learn when participating in activities?
- A The children who attend Forest School learn skills such as problem solving, social skills, team work and perseverance. These skills help them in their future at Warwick Prep and beyond.
- **Q** Will there be a possibility for girls of an older age to attend and participate at Forest School in the future?
- $m{A}$ It would be superb if another piece of land were adapted to suit girls of an older age.
- **Q** Which activities on offer at Forest School and in Nursery stand out for you, and why do the children and you enjoy them?
- A I enjoy hands on messy play the best, such as playing with the shaving foam and dancing to music. The children's favourite activity at Forest School is cooking popcorn over the fire whilst drinking hot chocolate with marshmallows.

Her Royal Highness was welcomed by children from local primary schools, as ten Brethren from the Lord Leycester Hospital formed a Guard of Honour. Accompanied by the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, and Chair of Warwickshire County Council, the Princess spoke with local charities and organisations at Warwick Hall, including Helping Hands, Kissing it Better, Young People First and Armonico Consort.



Mr Nicholson introduced the new project, 'Warwick – A Singing Town', which aims to bring singing into the lives of more young people in Warwick and promote the health and social benefits of singing. Jeremy Dibb, who leads the programme, was supported by the Classic FM Presenter, Catherine Bott, a Patron of Warwick – A Singing Town, and a former pupil of King's High. Students from St Mary Immaculate Catholic Primary School, one of ten Warwick schools involved in the scheme, also performed for the Princess. The programme is funded by the King Henry VIII Endowed Trust, through the Foundation.





As she left Warwick Hall, pupils from Warwick Independent Schools Foundation's Combined Cadet Force formed a Guard of Honour. Pupils and staff from Warwick Preparatory School and Warwick Junior School greeted the Princess, before she was introduced to Mrs Sally Austin. Chair of Foundation Governors.

Her Royal Highness toured the new King's High School, starting with the Arts and Sports building where she met and spoke with pupils and staff. She was introduced to Dr Stephen Burley, Head Master of King's High and Ms Liz Middleton, creator of 'The Spirit of King's' sculpture. The Head Girl team spoke about the school's new Changemaker Gallery, and the Prefects were then introduced to her.
